

Could we remind all reporters to please keep a record of patient's details when notifying a case to the BAPS-CASS team. We do not receive or hold any identifying information on the cases report to us here in Oxford. If a follow up study were planned we rely entirely on the BAPS-CASS reporters to be able to identify the patients involved in the original study. We recommend that reporters fill in and keep the appropriate section of the blue BAPS-CASS reporting card and that in the event of change of reporter that this information is passed on to the new clinician assuming the role. Please let us know if you need any more plastic wallets to store the cards.
